## MESSAGE FROM THE DIRECTOR

Some disasters such as house fires are preventable, but other disasters like snow storms are not. So what do we do if we can't prevent a disaster? We can mitigate or reduce the impacts of these hazards on life and property. For example, installing flood gauges and informing residents about how to prepare for floods can help minimize flood-related injuries, deaths, and damage to homes. Mitigation measures can also save individuals, communities, and businesses money as they reduce the amount of damage and cost of repairs after disasters. Anne Arundel County's [Hazard Mitigation Plan](#) creates a long-term strategy to reduce the costs and damages caused by disasters and helps create more resilient communities. As we work to update the plan we will reach out for community input in the Spring of 2024. ## WARMING RELIEF

Anne Arundel County has made several facilities available for warming relief this winter. If you need temporary relief from the cold weather, stop in and use the designated facilities during their normal business hours. When temperatures drop we encourage residents and visitors to do the following:

- Dress in layers to stay warmer for longer. This also gives you more flexibility to remove layers while still staying warm.
- Prepare for the unexpected. Most hypothermia cases occur due to an unexpected change in the weather or temperature, so keep extra gloves, hats, and a coat in your car.
- Wear a warm hat when going outside.
- Avoid getting wet when the temperatures drop.
- Wear waterproof boots or shoes to keep your feet dry.
- Drink plenty of water and avoid nicotine, caffeine, and alcohol which can cause dehydration.

Expo is a free, family-friendly event with hands-on displays, games, and activities to provide a fun-filled way to learn about preparing for emergencies. ## DISASTER AVERTED

In September, a concerned resident reported potentially threatening activity against a church in Virginia to the Anne Arundel County Police, who then alerted their counterparts in Virginia. Local police spotted the suspect's car, as the church's security team was also responding to the suspicious behavior. The armed suspect was arrested without further incident. Thanks to quick reporting and the church's preparedness, a potential disaster was averted. This highlights the importance of SEE SOMETHING...SAY SOMETHING, which encourages people to report suspicious behavior to authorities. This also shows how having a well-practiced emergency plan and a vigilant security team can help prevent disasters.

## AAACERT



The Anne Arundel - Annapolis Community Emergency Response Team (AAACERT) is a non-profit organization that vets, trains, and certifies volunteers to prepare for hazards and cope with emergencies. AAACERT courses and drills cover basic disaster prevention, preparation, and response skills, such as fire safety, light search and rescue, team organization, communications, and emergency medical procedures. AAACERT members also support training, exercises, and emergency operations for Anne Arundel County and the City of Annapolis' Offices of Emergency Management. ## OUTREACH INITIATIVES



Fall is one of the busiest outreach seasons with tons of different community events. Our staff supported each Police District and the Sheriff's Office in 10 Trunk-or-Treat events. We also supported the Kunta Kinte Heritage Festival, Hispanic Health Festival, Dia de los Muertos (Day of the Dead) Festival, and Disability Awareness Day. We also provided preparedness presentations, First Aid, CPR/AED, Stop the Bleed, and Civilian Response to Active Shooter Events (CRASE) training in both English and Spanish to Rotary and Kiwanis Clubs, Scout Troops, senior communities, schools, and faith-based organizations. ## TRAINING AND EXERCISE



We hosted a bunch of workshops to help review and update the Emergency Support Functions (ESFs) within the County's Emergency Operations Plan (EOP). We held one in October to develop a new ESF focusing on External Affairs and in November we covered multiple ESFs including Firefighting, Search and Rescue, and Hazardous Materials. We also hosted a Special Event Tabletop Exercise to discuss what plans, policies, and procedures are in place to respond to incidents at large events such as parades and festivals. Additionally, we supported other local and regional exercises to help better prepare our Central Maryland region.

## LEPC MEETINGS

The Anne Arundel County Local Emergency Planning Committee (LEPC) serves as a community venue to discuss and plan for chemical emergencies and other disaster plans, training, communications, and outreach. The committee meets virtually every 3 months on the first Monday to provide updates and discuss different emergency operations efforts. Each LEPC meeting also features speakers who present on topics of interest to the preparedness community.
